




Objective

A survey of Atlantan voter attitudes towards public safety and the closure and replacing of the Atlanta City Detention Center with a Center for Equity and Wellness.





Key Findings



- 1. Despite crime being the top issue for Atlantans most people personally feel safe: although crime is overwhelmingly the top issue (46%) nearly everyone (88%) feels safe in their own neighborhood.
- 2. Atlantans are embracing a more progressive approach to public safety: every way that the question was asked, the majority of voters prefer progressive approaches to preventing the causes of crime rather then more police and jails to respond to crime.
- 3. The urgency of crime plus progressive preferences toward criminal justice reform creates a ripe political environment for closing ACDC.
- 4. Super majority of Atlanta voters support closing ACDC after messaging: 66% of likely voters support closing ACDC when we asked following persuasive messaging, 54% support closing ACDC initially.
- 5. Atlanta voters are even more likely to support candidates that are willing to close ACDC. After messaging, majority of all voters, including 64% of Black voters and 73% of young voters, are more likely to support candidate that will close ACDC










Despite almost everyone believing crime has increased, almost every feels safe













Q14. Are you more or less likely to support a candidate, whether that is for Mayor or City Council, that supports closing the Atlanta City Detention Center?





Minimal differences between each very compelling fact




